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


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Hello Friends & Neighbors!

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
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"One Heck of A Party!"

"I was born outside of Chicago, in Downers Grove, Illinois," recollects island icon Betty Kai, who is the mother of 3, grandmother to 8 and great-grandmother of 2, along with her two beloved dogs.

"Dad worked for the railroad at the time – remember, this was the Great Depression – and as I grew older, he kept getting 'bumped,' meaning other people took his job, so we moved around quite a bit; in fact, I spent 3rd Grade in five different schools! We ended up in Rockford, Illinois, where I attended East High School, before eventually moving to Wiscon-

sin. Around that time, my then-husband and I married and lived in a cottage on a lake where we worked at a little bar on weekends, he tended bar and I served cocktails. On New Year's Day 1964, the owner went to the bathroom and suddenly passed away, and his widow did not want the place, so we purchased it from her and kept it until we divorced in 1981. We had such fun running it that working in bars, taverns and restaurants became my way of life."

Betty moved to Madison, Wisconsin, where she worked for an attorney. She

met her significant other and relocated to another lake near Edgerton, Wisconsin, but sadly he passed away. "On top of that, my Stepmother, sister and Dad all died the same year, so I decided that those were signs that I needed to start a new life. In 1990, my daughter was living in the Ocala area and encouraged me to join her, so I said, 'what the heck; I'm going to Florida!"

While preparing to call Ocala home, Betty's stepdaughter was living on FMB and needed help taking care of her daughter for a few weeks, so she asked Betty if she could assist her. "I thought that FMB would be a nice place for a visit, so I said 'Yes.' My stepdaughter asked if I could stay another week and by then I met David who became my next significant other. We hit it right off and he and another friend needed a place to stay so we all got a big house together near the Pink Shell Resort and split expenses and that ended my move to Ocala."

Sunset Betty!

In December 1990, Betty worked at a lumber store, but in February 1991, the legendary beach bar, Jimmy B's, opened and they hired her. "I was a cocktail waitress but they soon let their manager go and folks told the owner, 'Betty owned a bar in Wisconsin; make her the new manager' and he agreed! It was a Jimmy B's tradition to distribute complimentary shots at sunset called 'Sunset Shooters' and customers began calling me, 'Sunset Betty!' The rumor was that I would not let the sun set into the Gulf of Mexico until I distributed a 'Sunset Shooter' to each

customer, then led everyone with the toast, 'Shooters Up; Shooters Down!' Unfortunately, Hurricane Charlie basically destroyed Jimmy B's but like I say, 'You can take away the places but you cannot take away the memories!'"

Jimmy B's was just the beginning of Betty's FMB bar and restaurant legacy. "After Jimmy B's, I went to the Channel Mark, then the Fish Monger. Next was Nervous Nellie's, followed by the Sunset Beach Grille, Nauti Parrot Dock Bar and now Nauti Parrot Oasis and Hurricane Tina's 5 Star Dive Bar FMB. I love Hurricane Tina's and hope we soon see more people return that have been gone since the storm."

Like Jimmy B's, several of Betty's former establishments no longer exist, "but remember, 'you can take away the places but you cannot take away the memories!' While they are all special to me, my favorite remains Jimmy

Anyone who sees Betty from early September through the winter knows she wears her allegiance to her beloved Green Bay Packers on her sleeve – or jersey! So, what is it like now for a devoted Green Bay fan without a Hall-of-Fame quarterback for the first time in three decades, with neither Brett Farve nor Aaron Rogers under center. "It is a little different with those guys gone, but I am still a loyal fan! My son in Illinois said about a year ago that it may be a good time to change my allegiance, perhaps to Tampa Bay since I live in Florida for so long, but I said, 'No Way!' A highlight of my life was when I went to a convention in Green Bay and met Hall-of-Fame quarterback Bart Starr, along with Fuzzy Thurston and several other Packers and had my photograph taken with Bart! Years later, Fuzzy moved to Marco Island and came to the PierSide Grill, then he and the

owner walked to Jimmy B's and I got to be friends with him. As great as Favre and Rogers were, the greatest Packer quarter-back of all time is Bart Starr!"

"Hobby" is Working

These days, Betty lives a few miles off-island so she weathered Hurricane Ian better than most. "I seriously thought about evacuating but the forecasts indicated that Ian would strike the Tampa area so it seemed safe to stay but it shifted its track. Once Ian hit, I admit I was petrified, it severely damaged my beautiful backyard where I often entertain but fortunately my home is on a slope and that elevation makes it slightly higher than the rest of my neighborhood and made all the difference. At one point, water flooded in through my doggie door but my friend Helen helped put on the cover and everything was fine after that so I had few issues. Most of my neighbors have duplexes so they had some flooding but minimal damage. We are a tight-knit community so it is wonderful we are all still together."

Betty's favorite "hobby" is "Working! Years ago, I enjoyed embroidery but I do not have time for that anymore. I work three morning shifts at Hurricane Tina's and do four evenings and Sundays at the Nauti Parrot Oasis on US41. When the Bel Air Beach Club reopens soon, I will be there Wednesdays and Saturdays. My Dutch Grandmother raised me that you do not sit around, so even as a teenager I joined my Uncle with the Ringling Brothers Circus! I love to work and when people ask me the key to my longevity, I reply, 'You work hard and you party hard!' After my workday shifts, in the evenings I enjoy games of solitaire, a beverage and watching the evening news."

Many on FMB know Betty as "Mrs. Claus!" "I became Mrs. Claus for the Tween Water Resort tree lighting ceremony as well as at various other places, and at the annual FMB 'Christmas Boat Parade,' I hand out cookies and candy near Nervous Nellie's. 'Mrs. Claus' is a big part of my life on the beach." And Betty is a marriage officiant on FMB, marrying well over 200 couples!

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

INGREDIENTS

- ¾ cup butter
- 2 onions, chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 bunch fresh parsley, chopped
- 2 (14.5 ounce) cans stewed or fire roasted tomatoes
- 2 (14.5 ounce) cans chicken broth
- 2 bay leaves
- 1 tablespoon dried or 2 tablespoons fresh basil
- ½ teaspoon dried thyme
- 1/2 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1 cup water
- 11/2 cups white wine
- 1½ pounds large shrimp peeled and deveined
- 1½ pounds bay scallops
- 18 small clams
- 18 mussels, cleaned and debearded
- 11/2 cups crabmeat
- 1½ pounds cod fillets, cubed


INSTRUCTIONS

Over medium-low heat melt butter in a large stockpot, add onions, garlic and parsley. Cook slowly, stirring occasionally until onions are soft.

Add tomatoes to the pot (break them into chunks as you add them). Add chicken broth, bay leaves, basil, thyme, oregano, water and wine. Mix well. Cover and simmer 30 minutes.

Stir in the shrimp, scallops, clams, mussels and crab meat. Stir in fish, if desired. Bring to boil. Lower heat, cover and simmer 5 to 7 minutes until clams open. Ladle soup into bowls and serve with warm, crusty bread!

FMB Woman's Club Hosts Annual Putt & Pub Crawl on January 20

Many island residents participate in golf scrambles fundraisers at various times, but Fort Myers Beach has its own unique golfing fundraiser with the Annual Putt & Pub Crawl, cosponsored by the Fort Myers Beach Woman's Club and the King Family Foundation, on Saturday, January 20.

"Foursomes with colorful and imaginative team names as well as unique costumes make their way to 9 beach bars and restaurants each of which features a unique putt-putt hole manned by an island nonprofit," explains Dawn Thomas, the FMB Woman's Club President and Putt & Pub Crawl Co-chair with Mari Torgerson. "Each nonprofit receives the proceeds from drink specials and other contests held at their respective hole. The nonprofit creates gift baskets that they raffle off at the end of the event."

The "Putt & Pub Crawl" golf round lasts throughout the afternoon as groups compete for 1st and 2nd Place, the Duffer's Award for highest score, the Best Dressed Team and Best Team Name, "but the main goal of the event is to raise money and awareness for the 10

nonprofits," says Dawn. "The Putt & Pub Crawl limits the registration to 60 teams or roughly 240 golfers with sell outs almost every year. An exciting addition to this year's "Putt & Pub Crawl" is the awards ceremony location, raves Dawn! "We are thrilled that the awards ceremony is at Margaritaville, as our entire island community has waited years for this dynamic new resort to open! The Margaritaville Sun Deck will be the perfect spot to celebrate our winners and enjoy the beach views."

For the 2024 Putt & Pub Crawl, the following nine FMB bars and restaurants partner with corresponding nonprofits: La Ola in Times Square with The Friends of the Mound House; Lah De Dah Beach Bar in Margaritaville with FMB Strong; Nervous Nellie's and the FMB Little League; Snug Harbor Waterfront Restaurant and the FMB

Community Foundation; The Beach Bar along with The Friends of Bay Oaks; The Lighthouse Tiki Bar & Grill for the FMB Chamber of Commerce; The Rude Shrimp Company for The Friends of Lovers Key; Wahoo Willie's and the FMB PTO; and Yucatan Beach Stand with The Friends FMB Public Library; as well as the FMB Woman's Club as the overriding sponsor.

"Putt & Pub Crawl registration is from 10 a.m. to Noon and teams must complete their golf rounds by 4:30 p.m.," says Dawn. "There is no formal order to play the nine golf holes so every team makes up their own course. Each hole sponsor supplies the putters and golf balls for your team. Once all nine holes are completed, teams proceed to the awards ceremony and dinner at the Margarita-ville Sun Deck. The ceremony will begin promptly at 5 p.m. with everything concluding at 6:30 p.m. In addition to the prizes, there will be raffles, drink specials and maybe a surprise or two!"

Plans Forming for a Late April Event

Calling all Beach Elementary School (BES) and Fort Myers High School (FMHS) alumni from the "Flower Power" generation of the 1960s! A fledgling committee of your classmates is in the initial stages of formulating a reunion from that era for this upcoming April 2024!

"I am a 1964 FMHS graduate," explains Dr. Joseph Busta, Jr. At our 50th reunion, a few of us former Beach Kids got together – as practically everyone who graduated from BES back then went to FMHS – and said the next time we do this, we should get the Beach Kids back together for our own reunion, as they are our true peer group! That got me talking

to Melinda (Gammon) Brondstetter and Joan (Eberhardt) Hensley to discuss it."

Because BES graduating classes are so small, however, Joe and his initial committee are expanding the scope of the Beach Kids Reunion. "Rather than just our class, we welcome anyone who during the decade of the 1960s lived on the island and graduated from BES and/or FMHS. Even if you are a little outside of that age range on either side, join us!"

What The Future Holds for The Island

Joe is already in communication with roughly 20 to 30 Beach Kids, "so we will soon be emailing reunion information. If you have not heard from me and

would like information, please contact me at jbusta@southalabama.edu and I will add you to our list."

Tentative Beach Kids Reunion plans call for a reception and dinner on Saturday, April 27; a BBQ picnic hosted by a FMHS classmate; and perhaps a program on Sunday, April 28, in conjunction with the Estero Island Historic Society, "if people can use the historic cottages by that time, with the Mound House as a back-up plan," Joe offers. "I am arranging for a speaker who can give us an in-depth perception of what FMB is still going through since Hurricane Ian as well as what the future holds for the island. We are in communication with the new Margaritaville Resort to be our Reunion headquarters."

A Special Time in The Life of FMB!

Joe recalls that "FMB was a pretty small place when we were in the BES, with maybe 1,800 year-round residents that ballooned up to around 4,000 people during the winter, so everyone knew everyone and it was common to hitchhike around the island. Everybody was laid back, without much of the commercialism that the island enjoys today, so we were a tight-knit community. The BES was grades 1 through 6 and when we graduated, we took buses to Fort Myers Junior High and FMHS. The big social activities were the FMB Little League, along with church-related events, and clubs like the Cub Scouts and of course hanging out at The Brezzy Freeze! We Beach Kids came together as great friends in a very smalltown type of way, with all the small-town trappings that go with that. The idea of getting as much of that group back together from near as well as far-flung places is an ambitious concept but we as a group are not getting any younger!"

The FMB "of our youth is a slice and period of time in FMB history, before commercialization came to the island, that is forever gone," philosophizes Joe. "Sure, we had our motels and vacation cottages and some restaurants and bars, but we were at heart a small town and that was a unique point in the history of FMB. Time changes everything, often for the better, but the days of our youth were a special time in the life of Fort Myers Beach!"

"We lost everything in our home, including our golf cart, boat and clothes, except for the shell of our house," reports Debby. "A neighbor stayed and took a video where you saw the water come rushing up the channel. He screamed that floodwater was overflowing his house and we knew instantly our home was gone too! It was actually a blessing to see that video because when we finally returned to FMB, we already knew what to expect, but it was still a shock."

Today, the Kildows live in Franklin, Tennessee. "After Ian, we were done with FMB," emphasizes Debby! "Steve has a cousin in the Nashville area who said we must check out Franklin as we would love it and we do! There is greenspace all around, with a lake, trails, and parks and we are three minutes from the historic Downtown where I have a parttime job at a wonderful shop that reminds me so much of where I worked at 'The Islander' at Santini Plaza and I meet a lot of really neat people! It is so different from FMB, with guite a southern vibe and culture. We are in the middle of 'Bourbon Country' and Steve now collects Bourbon and once a month, our neighborhood hosts a 'Bourbon Night!' We however returned to Southwest Florida last May for a visit and will come back again in February."

As for what Debby took from her Hurricane Ian experience, "I really learned to appreciate life and people. When we fi-



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
