As I write tonight, the season's first real cold front is filtering through Southwest Florida and those out on FMB are all wearing long pants and sweatshirts! With the Holiday season well underway and what passes for "a chill in the air" Fort Myers Beach-style, it makes me recall my first island Christmas experience.

I actually arrived on FMB for a three-month stay on January 3, 2009, so technically I missed Christmas, but most businesses and homes still had their Holiday decorations up, including the lovely Poinsettia Christmas Tree in Times Square. Being from Missouri, I never saw anything like it and could not stop taking photographs, like hundreds of thousands of other locals and visitors before and since; to me, it was the definition of an "Island Christmas!"

Sadly, my Father passed away late that year, so I returned to FMB for the 2009 Christmas season to recharge my batteries. One evening, a small group of people bicycled past where I was staying, singing and laughing and playing Holiday music, with their bikes adorned in festive decorations. I soon learned that two of those folks were Dan and Megan Allers, years before they would become FMB's Mayor and First Lady, and to me this was just Magic! In subsequent Christmases, I joined in on this annual tradition and watched with pride as the "Christmas Bicycle Parade" grew in numbers and stature, with the bicycle decorations and lights becoming more elaborate every season! We became such a large group of approximately 75 riders that a Lee County Deputy Sheriff provides us an escort! We welcome everyone to join us this year for the annual "Christmas Bike Parade & Ugly Sweater Party" on Saturday, December 16, beginning at The Rude Shrimp Co. at Moss Marina at 4 p.m. If you are a newcomer, you will have the time of your life!

The next year I became a fulltime islander; oddly enough on October 10, 2010 – 10/10/10 – and soon discovered another beloved FMB Holiday tradition – the annual "Christmas Boat Parade" on the first Saturday evening of each December. Coming from a completely landlocked state, this was another new visual and sensory perception and I immediately fell in love with it, as the boats were so festive with bright lights and Christmas motifs. Ian forced us to cancel this in 2022 so it is wonderful to have the "Christmas Boat Parade" back this year. It sails off from Salty Sam's Marina on Saturday, December 2, at 6 p.m. For the next two hours, you can marvel at this Holiday spectacle from many of FMB's favorite restaurants and bars; to see a partial list of these establishments, see our December Calendar of Events.

Another tradition that became near-and-dear to my heart was the Estero Island Historical Society "Open House" at the historic cottages near the entrance to the Matanzas Pass Preserve. It was there that I first met the legendary Fran Santini and became acquainted with her famous "Rum Balls!" Savoring just one was like spending an entire evening at your favorite watering hole! Fran and I became fast friends and when I would visit her, I learned that she froze a supply for "special friends" and got to enjoy one "offseason" from time to time!

FMB now has a relatively new island Holiday tradition, the "Christmas Tree Festival!" Ian forced the FMB Woman's Club to host it off-island last year but happily it returns to FMB this Holiday season at the Fort Myers Beach Library on Friday & Saturday, December 8 & 9. Finally, all of Fort Myers Beach will receive a magnificent Holiday present when the long-awaited and much-anticipated Margaritaville Resort opens the day after Christmas! Margaritaville is a gift that will keep on giving and a true sign of FMB's rebirth after the devastation of 15 months ago.

The Bronsords Have a Purpose On FMB

"Our marriage is proof that what happens in Vegas does not always stay in Vegas," laughs Bill Bronsord when recalling his first meeting with Dana, his future wife! Dana is originally from Wellsburg, West Virginia, while Bill is a St. Petersburg native. She graduated from Youngstown State University with a Physical Therapy degree while playing varsity soccer, then attended the University of Maryland to attain her Doctor of Science and Physical Therapy. Bill attended Santa Fe College where he earned his Construction Management Degree.

They met in Las Vegas in 2009: "I was there for a bachelorette party while Bill was celebrating his 30th birthday," remembers Dana. "I was with roughly 15 friends when I saw Bill across the swimming pool and said I was going to introduce myself and they said, 'Are you kidding' but I replied, 'There is something about him,' so I did! It was his last day there so we talked a lot, then exchanged emails."

Bill felt the attraction as well, though he admits that "it helped that Dana was wearing a bikini and high heels!" The next weekend, Bill flew to Baltimore to visit her and that was the beginning of a six-year long-distance relationship. "I telephoned my Mom," Dana adds, "and said I just met the man I will marry and she immediately panicked!" They wed in the Florida Keys in 2015 on Dana's October 10th birthday.

When they met, Bill was already an islander. "I was on an internship with a custom home builder in Naples in 2002. I came to FMB and immediately fell in love with the vibe, its proximity to the Gulf and – back then – homes were so affordable. I bought a little fixer-upper in Fairview Isles. Twenty-one years later, we are still in Fairview Isles but now in our fifth different house,

having designed and built our latest in 2020, so it is fair to say that we love our neighborhood!"

Dana had no first-hand knowledge of FMB "but my grandparents had a place in Clearwater and when I visited as a little girl, I felt even then that one day I would live in Florida. When I came here, we drove down Estero Boulevard and I thought, 'This is an interesting little beach town' and it reminded me of my hometown where everyone knows your name so there was an instant attraction. One of the first things I asked Bill was where was the physical therapy practice and when he said there was not one. I thought. 'Hmm!' That was the seed that eventually became IslandFit Physical Therapy & Wellness."

While IslandFit was a future dream. Bill began Tunaskin Aquatic Apparel around the time they met. "I came up with the concept while boating and fishing in the Florida Keys. I wanted a product that was conducive to a water lifestyle that would be super comfortable and guickly dry, so I experimented with various fabrics until I found the perfect one. We opened the first Tunaskin at FMB's north end in 2015, then expanded to Key West in 2017, Sarasota in 2019 and Bonita Springs later that year." Dana explains the unique name: "Tuna are the only fish that have skin rather than scales and that lack of resistance is why they swim so fast!"

Dana opened her initial IslandFit at Santini Plaza in December 2014, then expanded off-island to Summerlin Square Drive a year prior to Ian. "Thank God we did," she explains, "as that location came through Ian in great shape while the Santini Plaza spot was a total loss."

We Had a Purpose

"We stayed in our home with our beloved dog Viva for Ian," recollects Dana, "and it was terrifying! For Irma, we evacuated the island to Bonita so there is no comparison. Fortunately, Bill built our home to survive a Category 5 – where building codes called for 10 hurricane straps, he installed 20 – but after 10 straight hours of non-stop pounding, you had to wonder. When we looked out the windows, you saw your entire community float by. Just as terrifying was the next morning, where there was devastation all around and we helped rescue people and animals, so we had a purpose."

"We saved a few of our belongings in our garage such as our bikes that became our means of transportation for several weeks since we lost all of our vehicles," Bill explains. "Our home held up so well that we were one of the first houses on the entire island to regain power so we were back home in just a few weeks. The strange part is that we did not see another single light anywhere for the longest time; everything was pitch black." "That was scary," adds Dana. "Being in our house without our neighborhood and community did not make it feel like our home. It was eerie and kind-of like being in a zombie movie!"

When contemplating if they will stay in their home for the next major hurricane, Bill emphatically answers "NO! But as much as lan put us in harm's way, we are grateful we could immediately help all those who were worse off than us so I would not trade the experience for anything." "I agree," says Dana, "but I do not want to go through that again!"

Their businesses were not so fortunate. "We first walked to IslandFit and discovered that a 15-foot storm surge

destroyed it," explains Dana. "It literally took my breath away. Then we made the 6-mile walk down Estero Boulevard, through all the sand and debris, to Tunaskin." "The windows and doors were gone," remembers Bill, "and the surge stripped off the walls up to the ceiling. There was not one single piece of apparel left."

But the Bronsords had a lucky break. "We ordered a custom-built Tunaskin trailer to take to fishing tournaments and boat races and it arrived about a month prior to lan. We safely stored it in Fort Myers and it survived." "That trailer was a Godsend," emphasizes Dana. "It became our FMB store that we reopened less than two months after lan." The temporary Tunaskin got them through while they rebuilt the permanent store. "We reopened that last month," says Bill. As for Island-Fit, "that will be back too," Dana promises. "We will return to Santini Plaza as soon as the landlord is ready for us."

The Best of FMB!

Life today for the Bronsords is "non-stop," Dana explains. "Fortunately, we have each other, as we are equal teammates. After something like lan, you learn who your friends and family truly are. We are incredibly thankful for our employees who are like family, as without them, we would not be where we are today." As for their Fairview Isles neighborhood, "more people return every week so that is encouraging," she reports. "There are roughly 40 houses on our street and a couple of hundred in our neighborhood and I estimate that people live in 30 percent of them. There is now landscaping at our entryway and cul-de-sacs and it is amazing what a difference trees and flowers make. We have neighbors on either side of us again and even had a neighborhood Halloween Party."

The Bronsords are well-known for their charitable contributions. They host a fishing tournament for wounded veterans, including arranging for flights, accommodations and boats. "It is about helping those who are less fortunate than us," Bill shares. "To see the response from the veterans is incredible. *continued on page 9*





Christmas Poinsettia Tree

The Origin of An FMB Holiday Tradition!

One of the most popular and photographed FMB Holiday sights is the Poinsettia Christmas Tree in Times Square, but who and what began this annual tradition?

"I was in on the ground floor of this one," laughs Anita Cereceda, the first and only three-time FMB Town Mayor who people lovingly refer to as the "First Lady of Fort Myers Beach!" "Somewhere around 1997, during my first term as Mayor, about two years after the birth of the Town and shortly after the Community Redevelopment Agency created Times Square, they planted a little palm tree there in front of the fishing pier. As that Holiday season approached, my friend David and I strung Christmas lights around it. The palm tree was so small we only needed a step ladder to do it! Everyone loved the concept. One couple, however, came up to us and cautioned, 'You two better be careful because the Town has a Mayor now and HE may not like this so you better check with HIM!' David looked at me and asked, 'Is this all right' and I laughed. I then introduced myself and that couple exclaimed, 'Oh My Goodness!'"

During the following year, Anita was at the Naples Waterside Shops "and in this little pond there was a pyramid of poinsettias and I thought, 'That looks wonderful; we could do that!' When I returned to Town Hall the next day, I went to then-Town Manager Marsha Segal-George and then-Public Works Director Ed Lawler, who was a one-man operation, and said, 'I have an idea' and they gasped, saying 'Oh No - what is it this time!' I showed them a sketch and said, 'what if we stacked poinsettias in a pyramid all around that palm tree to create a Christmas Tree, with the palm fronds acting as the "star."' They liked it so we did it and that began the tradition! As the palm tree grew larger each Holiday season, the base of the Poinsettia pyramid got correspondingly bigger. Folks loved it so much that they took family photos in front of the Poinsettia Christmas Tree!"

Then Ian struck on September 28, 2022, literally wiping out Times Square and the palm tree and it seemed as though the Poinsettia Christmas Tree tradition was lost, though local developer Joe Orlandini replaced the palm. "Then, of all a sudden,

a poinsettia plant spontaneously appeared near it," marvels Anita! "To my knowledge, this was not an organized campaign, just some unknown someone who did not want lan to end this beloved island tradition, and then another poinsettia showed up and another and another, almost as a tribute, and before you knew it, there were poinsettias everywhere around the palm – it was amazing! When I heard what was occurring, I made my first trip to Times Square since Ian and found the sight powerful and emotional. Then the Town rebuilt the frame and the Poinsettia Christmas Tree came back to life."

For Anita, "it was very emotional, as it stands right by the ruins of my family's long-time 'Pier Peddler" Times Square store and even now, one year later, I still get emotional thinking about it."

A Sign of Hope

Anita contemplates what the Poinsettia Christmas Tree means to the FMB community. "It is a sign of the Holidays, a gathering place, a location where you take your Christmas Card and family photographs, and quite simply, just something that everyone loves. In 2022 specifically, after Ian, it was a sign of hope and a statement that FMB is not giving up or giving in to our individual and collective devastation. It was islanders and visitors alike coming together, saying that we love Fort Myers Beach and we will rise again – we will not let Ian be the end but a new beginning. It became such a beautiful and fantastic tribute to the past as well as a sign of hope for our future; it was a beacon of hope, at least that is how it felt to me. Fort Myers Beach in general and Times Square specifically is such an important place to so many and an important part of my life."

Now that we are in the 2023 Holiday season, "this is the perfect opportunity to take stock of where we all are, now that lan is a year behind us," Anita philosophizes. "To me, some days it seems like lan was a long time ago and on others, it feels like yesterday, as many emotions are still so raw, so when you go through one of those rough days, remember our signs of hope, like the Poinsettia Christmas Tree, and know that brighter times are ahead. It can be easy to let everything overwhelm you but the Poinsettia Christmas Tree reminds us to be grateful for what we had and still have!" ■

After lan! Chester Rogers



Fort Myers Beach LIVING is catching up with our former Cover Story subjects, to learn what life is like for them "After Ian!" This month we speak with Chester Rogers who we profiled in June 2022.

"Ian inflicted quite a bit of damage to me but not in the way it did for most people on FMB. I rent on a third floor so physically I weathered the storm fine, but I lost over 200 pieces of artwork along with numerous drawings and calendars as well as my mobility scooter, so that is tough. I was fortunate in that I saved all the photographs of my children but losing so much of my artwork is sad."

Chester intended to evacuate FMB before lan's arrival, "but by the time local forecasters said we should go, the winds on the island were between 40 to 50 miles-per-hour and I did not dare drive my van over the Matanzas Pass Bridge, so I road lan out here. My building is strong and sturdy so I was never in fear for my life, but at one point I looked out and water completely covered my van so I knew all my paintings, drawings, books and supplies inside it were gone and that was devastating. While I was ready to evacuate, I lived in this area my entire life and never experienced anything like lan, so in that regard, the storm caught me off-guard! Physically, my tragedies occurred after Ian, as I fell and hurt my spine that required surgery and a nine-inch plate, then I broke my arm!" The thought of evacuating to a local shelter might discourage some, but Chester had a wonderful time when he did so for Hurricane Irma in 2017. "I drew portraits of roughly 50 children during Irma so it was a pleasurable experience; I had fun and the kids made me laugh and that took my mind off of Irma."

While his apartment made it through lan,



he lost electricity and moved in with his brother, but once power came back, Chester returned to FMB. "I am on Saint Peter's Drive near the Lutheran Church and, believe it or not, our neighborhood is mostly fine as we have many multi-level homes. Everyone sustained damage to their first floors but above that, things seem to be all right and some did not even have roof damage so we made out much better than most of the island. I acquired a car and I am back to drawing my caricatures."

The main lesson that Chester took from Ian was that "I will evacuate much earlier next time in case the warning to leave comes late. As for my post-Ian world, despite my back and arm, my life gets better every day! If you know of any event for Autistic or Down Syndrome children, please contact me as I do those for free. The kids get cool artwork and roughly \$50 in retail items and I enjoy every minute!" ■






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
