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
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Hello Friends & Neighbors!

change right around Ian's first anniversary and that continues through today — many of our individual "pieces" are now filling in the larger FMB puzzle. Some of those significant "pieces" are the grand opening of the Margaritaville Beach Resort FMB as well as the reopening of island institutions like the Beach Elementary School, Estero Island Historic Society cottages, Bay Oaks Recreational Center, the iconic Mound House and more, along with various bars, restaurants, businesses and our own beloved homes.

As Danielle rightfully said, "Now that we are a year-and-a-half past Ian, the Town looks better than I thought it would at this stage and it improves every day" and I agree! I hope your individual puzzle piece is coming along as well as mine – I moved back into my home just before the end of 2023 – as, one piece at a time, we all put back together the puzzle that is Fort Myers Beach!

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Danielle & Nick Dibona

"Most people on Fort Myers Beach know me as Danielle Felton, but I married my husband Nick on September 24, 2023, so I am a newlywed and now Danielle Dibona," she explains with a laugh! Danielle is originally from Sylva, North Carolina. "I was actually born in Maine but my parents moved to Sylva when I was two years old, so I consider North Carolina home. I attended Western Carolina University where I earned certifications in Nutrition, Fitness, and Personal Training."

Danielle and Nick met at Crunch Fitness in Fort Myers on Christmas Eve 2021, but her interest in him predates that by several years! "I first noticed Nick at Crunch Fitness six years before we met and I had a crush on him since the first time I saw him but not have enough nerve to introduce myself. You see the same faces at the gym over and again but almost never know their names, so my friend and I came up with imaginary nicknames for them and ours for Nick was 'Sexy Teddy Bear!'"

On Christmas Eve, Crunch Fitness is open just a half-day "so everyone jams in to get their holiday workout in all at the same time," explains Danielle. "The only free workout bench was next to him so I thought, 'why not – just say Hi.' Everybody wears ear buds so I awkwardly waved to get his attention, then said, 'I am sorry to interrupt but I just have to tell you that I really admire your work ethic."

They exchanged names and occupations and "Nick seemed receptive, saying it was nice to chat," Danielle continues. "I asked when he usually worked out and he said around 7 p.m. That was later than my usual time but for the next two weeks, I was there each evening at 7 but no Nick. I began to think I would never see him again and I told my tale of woe to the front desk girls who tracked down his last name. I sent him a Facebook message and he responded and everything took off from there! Nick happily tells everyone how great it is that I 'admired his work ethic' so maybe my lesson to other women

is that it is all right to make the first move! Two years later, we married in Wolcott, Connecticut, Nick's hometown."

That Was Perfect for Me

Danielle's introduction to FMB occurred due to happenstance as well. "While living in North Carolina, I married then divorced at a young age, so I was ready to move out of our small town. A local gentleman said he was going to expand his Cork & Barrel Restaurant to Fort Myers and said that if I would relocate, he would give me a job. I knew absolutely nothing about Fort Myers and asked if it was warm and close to a beach and when he said Yes to both, I replied, "I AM IN!" The Cork & Barrel specialized in tapas so I practiced saying that in a way that people could not confuse it with 'Topless,' as I did not want any misperception!" She waitressed there for ten months, then in 2016 went to the South Beach Grille for the next five years.

Good fortune further played a part in Danielle joining the FMB Town workforce. "Cork & Barrel had a couple of steady customers who lived on the island and I said I wanted to as well, so they drove me around to show me nice areas with available apartments. We cruised past the Bay Oaks Recreational Center and they said it was a great place, though hard to find. I soon discovered Bay Oaks was seeking a Coordinator for its 'Social Seniors' program for field trips, kayak tours and related events and that was perfect for me so I applied, then pestered them for three months until they hired me! When you work for a small department like Bay Oaks, you are really a 'Jack-of-All-Trades,' so in addition to Senior programs, I do special events, youth activities, fitness programs and even occasionally did some accounting!"


In lan's immediate aftermath, Danielle for roughly the next year took on a different role, as the Assistant to the two former Interim Town Managers, but returned to Bay Oaks in late 2023 as a Recreation Supervisor, as she "really missed working with the Seniors and children. I am excited to reenergize 'Social Seniors' programs. We are revamping many events for 2024, while returning those you know and love, with youth events already taking

off. We strive to make Bay Oaks, Bayside Park and all the island's parks and recreational facilities better than ever, full of fun activities and adventures! It is wonderful to have our afterschool program with the Beach Elementary School going again, as our island school children are our most precious resource."

Surreal & A Nightmare

Danielle and Nick live off-island, near Golisano Children's Hospital, "so we weathered Ian better than those on the island. We had three inches of water in the house so we had to replace the flooring, drywall and appliances. Like many people, we took Ian casually, assuming it would blow right past us, but when the wind started whipping and the water began rising into the house, I was scared, wondering why we did not evacuate. We will not make that same mistake again; we will move our furniture upstairs, pack up our dogs Ranger and Bandit, and leave."

While their home received some damage, it did not prepare Danielle and Nick for what they saw when they first returned to FMB. "It was surreal," she remembers; "it was like a nightmare from which you could not shake yourself awake! People were milling about aimlessly so we picked up as many as we could and transported them as best we were able. From that first moment, it amazed me how everyone came together to help each other out, despite the tragedy of their own lives. Nick eventually dropped me off at whatever

was left of Town Hall, then he continued to be basically an ad hoc taxi service to all those in need, the good man that he is "

Danielle recalls that Town Hall "was basically destroyed, with one wall completely gone. A day or two later, I made it to Bay Oaks. While I could enter, I could not get past the front desk, between the gobs of sludge and unbearable smell. I was so sad, as Bay Oaks contains years of happy memories for me."

Town employees resumed their duties in the same way residents were dealing with their own homes and businesses, says Danielle: "One piece at a time! There was no plan for what lan wrought so you do it one piece at a time. Each employee figured out what was in their power to accomplish that day, then the next day you again figured out what you could do and so on until a semblance of a plan came together. Now that we are a yearand-a-half past lan, the Town looks better than I thought it would at this stage and it improves every day. New Town Manager Andy Hyatt has every Town employee on the same page to benefit our citizens more and better than ever, as we have an awesome staff."

It Will Be Again!

In their spare time, Nick and Danielle enjoy mountain biking and adventure activities. "When we say mountain bike, people think we are crazy because where in flatas-a-pancake Florida can you find mountains," Danielle laughs! "Florida however is full of abandoned phosphorous mines that are now terrific offroad trails and great fun; we love to mountain bike on those with Ranger and Bandit running behind. We still work out and enjoy anything outdoors with our dogs. When we honeymooned in Hawaii, we did all we could there, including skydiving, repelling down a waterfall, hiking on an active volcano and of course mountain biking!"

As to what FMB will look like in five years, "I see a beautiful resort destination, with Margaritaville serving as the beginning of that vision," predicts Danielle. "That resort theme will grow and expand; as a result, FMB will most likely become a wealthi-

er community but that is not necessarily bad. Our property values rise and our businesses thrive on tourism dollars so a wealthier clientele is good for everyone. It is sad we will no longer be that community of quaint beach cottages but we will never lose our small-town atmosphere because the people who live here will not allow that to happen. FMB will always be a tourism destination so we might of as well lean into that, as this is who we are so let's do it well."

By far, FMB's strongest attribute is its people, raves Danielle! "The folks who call this place home are the absolute best and if you had any doubt, look at how we all banded together after Ian! FMB was awesome prior to Ian and our citizens will ensure it will be again!" ■

IN THE PILOT'S SEAT!

FMBCF Traces Its Beginning to Pilot International

The Fort Myers Beach Community Foundation (FMBCF) is a philanthropic and charitable organization dedicated to working cooperatively to improve the quality of life on FMB. Even though the FMBCF is in its 14th year, its island existence traces back to 1985, when it was a branch of Pilot International (PI) for its first quarter-century before reorganizing as the FMBCF in 2010.

Betty Simpson shares the unique distinction of being a charter member of both the Pilot Club Fort Myers Beach and the FMB Community Foundation!

"I certainly was a Pilot Club FMB charter member," Betty says proudly! "We started our club in December 1985 as an offshoot of the Pilot Chapter of Fort Myers, who affectionately called us their 'Beach Babies!' There were 12 to 15 charter members and we met in a meeting room in the old First Federal Bank that was in front of the former Wynn Dixie grocery store that eventually became TOPPS but of course is now no longer there. After all these years, I am happy to say that there are a few of us charter members still around. Personally, I was a professional pilot in those days, so the name 'Pilot International' intrigued me because I initially thought it was a group regarding aviation!"

The connection to the Fort Myers chapter was necessary because "Pilot International required that you could not form a new

chapter but needed an invitation and the Fort Myers group felt that FMB was a logical place to expand. Back then, you needed to be a professional or executive woman to be a member so individual invitations were necessary to join and that was part of the charm. Pl eventually morphed into a more encompassing organization that accepted members from all walks of life."

She greatly enjoyed the cosmopolitan aspect of PI. "I liked being a member of an International club where you spread your wings outside your local area and met a wide variety of people. I became the Lieutenant Governor for the Florida Southwest region so I attended many regional conventions and functions and found it fascinating to meet PI members from Japan, for instance, where you experienced their culture and traditional dress. I felt that being a member of an international group gave us a certain prestige that you could not acquire from a local organization. It expanded our horizons and I personally liked all the pomp-&-circumstance, as it made you different from every other local club."

Betty points out that the FMB chapter "enjoyed an outstanding 25-year run! I really liked it but PI had a strict structure to its organization, so members from the Fort Myers club frequently attended our island meetings to ensure we followed the protocol and that was one of the reasons that ultimately led to our club parting ways with PI, as many of our members did not like that strict structure. Our club members had little interest in the international aspect of the PI experience, so that was a drawback. Another bone of contention was that a substantial amount of the funds we raised on the island went to the International organization rather than staying here on FMB. As we added more island members, they wanted to keep all of the money we raised here on the beach and I could appreciate that."

When the FMB group began discussions to break away from PI, "I personally did not want to do that," reflects Betty. "Once the beach chapter made that official and formed the FMBCF, I did join but I and a small core group continued to attend PI meetings in Fort Myers and we fairly enjoyed that. FMB, however, was my home so I ultimately chose the CF over PI. The CF was doing great things, many of my friends were members, and I

did like that everything we raised on the island stayed on the island, with our funds going to good organizations to benefit good people."

While Betty appreciates the essential fundraising arm of the FM-BCF, "the social aspect is so important, especially after what Hurricane Ian did to our island community! When I attend CF functions today, it is wonderful to see so many longtime friends; it feels like the band is back together! While we may live on an island, Ian made me realize that we are all not 'an island onto ourselves' and the social aspect of clubs like the FMBCF is every bit as important as its fundraising. The CF reminds us that we all remain connected no matter where we live these days; we are still one solid island community! The FMBCF is a heart-

beat onto itself and in my opinion is now the heartbeat of FMB. I am proud I am a charter member of both Pilot International FMB and the FMB Community Foundation, as there is a certain charm to being in on the ground floor of these outstanding organizations that benefit so many with so much."

Seafood Chowder

INGREDIENTS

- 3 (10 ounce) cans whole baby clams with liquid
- 4 tbsp butter unsalted
- 2 small shallots, diced
- 2 bay leaves
- 1/8 tsp fennel seeds (or celery seeds)
- 10 large sea scallops
- 10 large shrimp
- ½ pound boneless, skinless cod or other white fish, cut into chunks
- 1/4 pound boneless, skinless salmon, cut into large chunks
- 1/4 pound lobster meat, in chunks (optional)
- 1/4 cup white wine
- 1 large yellow onion, peeled and sliced
- 5 stalks celery, trimmed and diced
- ½ bulb fresh fennel, trimmed and diced
- 1 cup water
- 1 pound Yukon gold or other waxy potatoes, peeled & diced
- 2 cups heavy cream
- · Sea salt and cracked black pepper
- ½ bunch flat leafy parsley (about 2/3 cup) chopped
- ½ bunch chopped chives (about ¼ cup) (dill works well too!)
- ½ tsp pepper
- · Combine all ingredients; mix well

INSTRUCTIONS

Drain the clams and put clams in one bowl, liquid in another. You will need 13/4 clam liquid; if you do not have enough, add water or bottled clam juice.

In a large pot over medium heat, melt the butter with shallots, bay leaves, and fennel seeds and cook, stirring until shallots are tender, about 5 minutes. Place the scallops, shrimp, cod, and salmon into the pot and add the white wine. Cover and steam for 5 to 7 minutes until seafood is partially cooked. Remove all the seafood with a slotted spoon.

Add the onions, celery, and fennel to the pot. Cook until onions are translucent, 7 to 10 minutes. Add the reserved 1% cup clam juice, 1 cup water, and the potatoes. Cook until potatoes are tender. Add the cream and canned clams. Bring to a simmer; adjust seasoning. Place all of the remaining cooked fish back into the pot and heat through.


