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


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## Hello Friends & Neighbors!

We've weathered the storms with you.

Heidi and Bruiser Jungwirth are from the Badger State of Wisconsin. "I am originally from Marshfield," says Heidi, with Bruiser adding that he is from Oshkosh. As for his unique moniker, "'Bruiser' is obviously not my real name but I prefer to keep it to myself; only a few people know my real name!"

They first met while working for FedEx Ground but their real relationship began at a party. "Heidi has bright red hair so you couldn't miss her," recalls Bruiser. "Friends threw a party but I already had another date for that evening. After my date went home, I went to the party and Heidi was there. We struck up a conversation and the rest is history!" They married in 2010 in Eagle River, Wisconsin, at the Butternut Lake Lodge, and they lived in Eagle River until relocating to FMB in 2012.

Bruiser began visiting FMB all the way back in 1985 and always enjoyed it. Back home, however, was a different

story. "I worked a FedEx Ground route during some horrible winters, near Lake Superior where it would snow for up to 28 days in a row," he recollects. "Finally, in 2012, I had enough of that and we decided to relocate to Florida. At first, we were looking in the Pensacola area but discovered that it can still get really cold there and sometimes even snow so we wanted someplace further south than that. I said that we should check out FMB, as I had been coming here since the 1980s and always liked it."

"Unlike Bruiser, that was my first time seeing FMB," adds Heidi, "and for me, it was love at first sight! While waiting for our rental car, we received a job offer so that told us that this was meant to be." They began managing the Surf & Us Beach Resort, then eventually opened their own vacation rental business.

#### **Anywhere in Ten Minutes**

Bruiser and Heidi live in the Bayside Estates, just off FMB. "We were on the

island until July of 2022, so just two months before lan," Heidi says. "We began by renting at Bayside, then liked it so much that we decided to buy. I love this area because it seems like we can get to wherever we want to go in ten minutes! We are right down from the beach and close to the grocery store and some terrific restaurants. Buying here checked a lot of boxes."

"I still go to the beach every day so this neighborhood is convenient for me," adds Bruiser. "Bayside Estates is getting better every day, just like the beach is getting better every day, but both remain works in progress. We would like to live on FMB again at some point in the future but it would have to be the right opportunity." "I don't know about that," laughs Heidi. "I'd say the odds for me are 50/50; you just don't know anymore and I am not alone in feeling that way."

As to if they have any apprehensions about living so close to the Gulf, "we are not afraid," says Bruiser. "I happen to think that another storm like Ian will not hit FMB for 20 years or more; it was more of a fluke than a pattern." "Even though we live on a canal, I feel pretty safe here," agrees Heidi. "I do admit, however, that it is now more stressful being a homeowner than when we were renters."

#### The Need is Still There

Heidi manages FMB Strong at 820 Buttonwood Drive, the local nonprofit founded by survivors of Hurricane Ian, dedicated to helping fellow lan survivors, along with those impacted by other disasters. "I love what I do because I get to help people every day and see that we are changing their lives for the better; that we really do make a positive difference. I have been with FMB Strong from our first day. Our vacation rental office was in 820 Buttonwood that was mostly a golf cart rental building back then. Almost immediately after lan, the owner, Tim Ryan, began FMB Strong and it was chaotic. Tim said to me that he needs someone who can jump right in and get everything not only up and running, but running smoothly, so I jumped right in!"

More than two years after Ian, "unfortunately, the need is still there," she explains. "It even picked up more after Helene and Milton last year. You repair your home and along comes another flood and you are down on your luck again. Just when it seems like things are getting back to a sense of normalcy and people think they can breathe a little easier, something else always seems to come along."

Bruiser keeps his foot in the rental property business along with doing odd jobs here and there. "I'm a 'Grunt Man,' he laughs! "The property management business is way different than before lan. Back then, we had 37 units and that dropped all the way down to three. Today it is back up to six."

#### "We Like Beer!"

Bruiser's "hobby" is brewing his own beer. "We like beer," exclaims Heidi! "I began doing my own microbrewing about 10 years ago," explains Bruiser. "I came up with the 'Lazy Coconut Brewing Company,' along with Tre Gillette of the former 'Tuckaway Café' and FMB Mayor Dan Allers, that we were just getting ready to open inside the 'Tuckaway' on the island but then Ian happened. Folks seem to like our beer way more than anything they buy from the store."

#### Such as Special Place

Heidi is a member of the Fort Myers Beach Woman's Club as well as the FMB Community Foundation. "They are phenomenal clubs but of course it is the members who make them phenomenal. My fellow members are an amazing group of people who are always there for the island community, through thick and thin." Bruiser volunteers at FMB Strong "all the time, but sometimes it is not 'volunteer;' it is 'Volun-Told!'" They give back to their community for a simple reason: "This is our home and you do that for your home," philosophizes Bruiser.

When they contemplate what Fort Myers Beach will look like five years, "I think that it will be pretty cool," Bruiser says enthusiastically. "There will be more restaurants on the beach and more things to do. As for the traffic, it is what it is and there is nothing you can do about it so deal with it. FMB will probably no longer be a quaint little beach town anymore and there will be a lot of big condominiums and hotels but there will still be neighborhoods too so it will be a nice mixture. I think it will be pretty cool when most of the rebuilding is done." "There will be a lot more tall buildings," predicts Heidi, "so I hope FMB does not lose its smalltown charm. This community shows such resilience and that is a wonderful testament to its people; they are what make it such a special place."

On that, Heidi and Bruiser agree: "We stay here because of the people," he offers. "We have so many friends and everyone we meet are terrific. It's not the architecture that makes a town but its people." "FMB has a true sense of community and that is why we are still here," concludes Heidi. "There are other places in which we could live but the people and their sense of community keep us here."







"The beloved Fort Myers Beach Public Library reopened on Sunday, March 16, almost 2-1/2 years after Hurricane Ian," relates Jan Fleming, the Secretary of the Board of Directors for "The Friends of the FMB Public Library." "We waited a long time for that magical day!"

Jan explains the main reasons for the lengthy delay. "The primary one was the significant repairs necessary to the

FMB Library's signature elevator. The Library must be in ADA-compliance, even if many of our patrons could use the staircase, or we would be a liability risk. A further complication arose because the company that installed the elevator is no longer in business so we had to find another one, and then it took a long time to acquire the necessary parts. Anyone who lives in an FMB condominium knows the struggles of reacti-

vating elevators, as some island condos have yet to repairs theirs. While it was frustrating for our patrons, no one wanted to reopen the Library faster than our fantastic staff."

In addition to the elevator repairs, the Library required an extensive mitigation process. "The mitigation team discovered a small leak in the roof, but fortunately little water came inside the



building. Unfortunately, the storm surge destroyed the Children's Area as well as all our staff offices. The mitigation team immediately set up all sorts of hoses and generators, to get the air conditioning going, to preserve as much of our printed materials as possible. A lot of work went into our reopening."

Jan says that patrons will notice a few new attractions when they first visit the FMB Public Library. "We commissioned local artist Summer DeSalvo to do a beautiful new mural in the Children's Area based on the kids' book, 'Rainbow Fish,' and it is so cute! On a somber note, the Town donated to the Library the plaque listing the names of all the islanders we lost to Hurricane lan, including the Library's own beloved greeter, Mitch Pacyna. We all terribly miss Mitch and dedicated the plaque in his honor."

#### **Proud About What He Built**

When the Library's late Director, Dr. Leroy Hommerding, oversaw its significant 2013 expansion, he proudly proclaimed

that no matter how powerful a future hurricane, the new Library would survive! So how did Dr. Leroy's prediction hold up?

"Well, the Library still stands," exalts Jan! "Except for the storm surge damage, the Library held up and we were able to repair it under the 50% Rule so I would say that Dr. Leroy's prediction came true! I truly believe that as Ian struck FMB, Dr. Leroy was watching over us and was proud of what he built."

For Jan, the greatest aspect of the FMB Public Library is that "it is such a great community building and a destination site! It brings together diverse groups from throughout the island and beyond.

For instance, the Estero Island Garden Club decorates our Christmas Tree year-round, with a different motif each month. Islanders and tourists alike flock to the Library to see our distinctive and beautifully painted elevator. People love to view our aquariums, see the gigantic doll-house or to take part in assembling our community jigsaw puzzles. The 'Friends of the FMB Library' operates the 3rd Floor 'Used Book Store' where vacationers can acquire great used books for just a few dollars. There is truly something for everyone at the FMB Public Library!"

As to what it means to have the FMB Library open again, "oh my gosh, it feels like another step toward FMB getting back to normal," Jan exclaims! "Every time another island institution like the FMB Public Library returns, it is another baby step toward a revitalized FMB. # Deviled Eggs by Sandy Sandness

#### **CLASSIC DEVILED EGGS: A TIMELESS FAVORITE**

- Oven Method: Preheat the oven to 325°F. Place each egg in a muffin tin and bake for 30 minutes. Once done, cool in an ice bath for 10 minutes.

#### **MAKING PERFECT DEVILED EGGS**

The secret to flawless deviled eggs starts with properly cooked and easy-to-peel hard-boiled eggs. Try one of these foolproof methods:

- Peel & Slice: Once cooled, gently remove the shells and slice the eggs in half lengthwise.
- 2. Prepare the Filling: Scoop out the yolks into a mixing bowl. Add mayonnaise or a mix of mayo and Greek yogurt, along with pickle relish, mustard, salt, and pepper. Mash and mix until smooth, adjusting seasoning to taste.
- **3. Fill the Egg Whites:** Spoon or pipe the creamy yolk mixture back into the egg whites. Chill until ready to serve. For a finishing touch, sprinkle with paprika for color and a hint of spice.



"It's been a few titles over the years, like 'Casino Night' and 'Viva Las Vegas,' but 'Vegas Night' is the same concept."

"Vegas Night" attendees receive a \$2,000 voucher to play casino-type games like Craps, Blackjack, three- and five-card Poker and Roulette, with multiple tables for many of those. Patrons win "gaming chips" that they redeemed for tickets to place in raffle boxes to win fabulous gift baskets and prize packages from leading local businesses, restaurants and resorts. Near the end of the night, the FMBCF draws the winning ticket for each prize at roughly 10 p.m. "Don't worry if you lose your entire \$2,000 voucher," laughs Alicia. "You can buy more, either to continue to

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play the games, or to place tickets into the raffle boxes for the gift package drawings."

Alicia adds that there is so much more to "Vegas Night" than just the casino-style games. "The evening features scrumptious heavy hors d'oeuvres and a lavish dessert table. There is a signature cocktail as well as a cash bar. There will be a live band and you will marvel at all the tremendous gift baskets and 'stay-cations' for experiences like golfing and nearby attractions."

#### A Great Vibe!

In 2024, the FMBCF hosted their casino-style fundraiser for the first time since Hurricane Ian and it was so positive that there was no question they hold it again in 2025. "The reaction was overwhelming," recalls Alicia! "People were ready for something light and fun, that rekindled a slice of normalcy. Folks dressed up just like they would for Las Vegas and reveled in going from gaming table to gaming table, while dancing to the music and savoring the food. The entire evening was a lot of fun, with a great vibe!"

While "Vegas Night" is literally fun and games, there is a serious reason behind the evening. "This is a Community Foundation fundraiser," reminds Alicia. "We will raise thousands of dollars and will use every penny to benefit those in need in our island community. The FMBCF has a long history of supporting organizations like the Bay Oaks Recreational Center, Estero Island Historical Society, and the FMB Art Association as well as many others, along with our own scholarship fund for local students."

"Vegas Night" tickets are \$100-per-person; to purchase yours, go to the FMB Community Foundation webpage at www. fmbcommunityfoundation.com. "Last year's event sold out," cautions Alicia, "so buy yours ASAP."

For Alicia, the best part of the last year's "Vegas Night" was that "I never played three-card Poker in my life and I couldn't stop winning, so I kept exclaiming, 'I LOVE THIS GAME!' By the end of the night, no one else had any chips while I had a big stack so I told everybody, 'here – take some of mine!'"

If you are not an FMB Community Foundation member, Alicia encourages you to join. "I first became a member all the way back when the CF was still the Pilot Club and I have done everything from being on the Executive Board to an officer to serving as a Chairperson for events like the 'Vegas Night,'" advises Alicia.
