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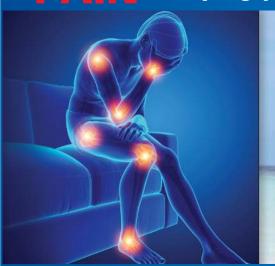

Fort Myers Beach Took My Breath Away!

While it was not love at first sight for Barb over Jack, it was for FMB! "In the mid-1970s, my parents moved to Florida and I visited them often during the cold winter months. Even though Lake Michigan has beautiful beaches, once

Barb's first visit to FMB was with her 3 sisters - Arthea, Shirley & Jan. They went to lunch at the Pink Shell Beach Resort! "The minute we drove north over the Big Carlos Pass Bridge, the water view & beaches of FMB was utterly breathtaking" gushes Barb. "We lived in Naples at the time, but I never forgot the beauty of FMB after that day! In 2000, when we decided to make the move to FMB, we began the search for a waterfront home with a dock & pool. We found a cute little bungalow that needed a lot of renovation, but we were up to the task! The home today is not majestic, but it is a comfortable place where family and guests always feel welcome."

Barb was a hairdresser, an HR manager, and legal secretary in Michigan. Upon moving to Florida, she traveled

with American Airlines and was a freelance court reporter. In 2003, she earned a Florida real estate license, a Florida Brokers license in 2005, an E-Pro Designation, a GRI designation (Graduate Real Estate Institute) and a Senior Real Estate Specialist (SRES) designation. She sold real estate on FMB until taking the position of Managing Broker at Waterside Realty Group, Inc. in Bonita Springs where she still practices today.

When contemplating their hobbies, "our number one hobby is each other," enthuses Jack! "I enjoy the beach, travel, fishing, boating, hunting and basically anything outdoors, as well as schmoozing!" "I am a mediocre golfer," laughs Barb, "and like Jack, I love anything outdoors. I couldn't agree more that our main hobby is each other. Jack is still my boyfriend! Early Years

In Michigan, Barb & Jack always wanted to work and build a business together. "So in 1978", Jack said, "we bought some acreage and built the "North Pole Ice Cream Store"! Later, we added twin 18-hole miniature golf courses, batting cages with 12 pitching machines, a pizza and sub shop, a 6-bay carwash (Northern Pole) and The North Pole Game Room. Our kids' first jobs growing up were on the premises with us whenever they weren't in school or playing sports. We also started a trophy & silkscreen business which led to an interior/exterior sign shop that eventually overwhelmed everything else! So, we sold all the businesses and moved the sign shop and newly added wood shop to a 300,000-square-foot building in the city."

Living on the Coast: Beauty with Risk

Fort Myers Beach is no stranger to the power of Mother Nature. Hurricane Ian was a stark reminder of how quickly life can change. In just hours, homes were damaged or destroyed, businesses closed, and lives disrupted.

But what the storm couldn't wash away was our sense of community. We rebuilt. We helped our neighbors. We kept moving forward.

Still, as we rebuild stronger, smarter, and more prepared, one of the most important pieces of that resilience puzzle is having the right insurance in place—before the next storm comes.

The Basics: What Every Homeowner Needs

Whether you're a full-time resident, a snowbird, or you rent out your property seasonally, having the proper insurance coverage is essential. Let's break down the basics.

Homeowners Insurance

Standard homeowners insurance covers your structure, personal property, liability, and additional living expenses if you're forced out due to a covered loss. However, in coastal areas like Fort Myers Beach, it's not always so straightforward.

Many policies here carry separate wind and hurricane deductibles—often a percentage of your home's value. That means a \$500,000 home with a 2% hurricane deductible



could require you to pay \$10,000 out of pocket before your policy kicks in.

Also, standard homeowners policies do not cover flooding. That brings us to...

Flood Insurance

Even if you're not in a high-risk flood zone, flood insurance is a must in Fort Myers Beach. FEMA estimates that just one inch of water in your home can cause more than \$25,000 in damage.

There are two main options:

- National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) Backed by FEMA, with set coverage limits.
- Private Flood Insurance May offer higher limits and additional coverage options.

Flood zones change, so make sure to review your property's flood zone status regularly—especially after new FEMA maps are released.

Wind Insurance

Depending on your carrier, wind coverage might be part of your homeowners policy or it might need to be written separately through a specialized carrier. This is especially true for homes closest to the Gulf.

Condo Owners

If you live in a condo, your HOA's master policy only covers common areas and the exterior structure. It's your responsibility to cover the inside of your unit—walls in, including flooring, cabinets, and personal belongings. That's where an HO-6 condo policy comes in.

And yes, even condo owners need separate flood insurance.

What About Rental Properties?

If you rent out your home or condo, even part-time, you need to tell your insurance company. A homeowners policy assumes owner-occupancy. Rental activity could invalidate your coverage if not disclosed.

Consider:

- Landlord Policies for long-term rentals.
- Short-Term Rental Insurance for platforms like Airbnb and Vrbo.
- Liability Coverage in case a guest gets injured on your property.

Make sure your policy includes loss-of-rent coverage in case your property becomes uninhabitable after a covered event.

Auto Insurance in a Storm-Prone Area

If your vehicle is damaged in a hurricane, you're only covered if you have comprehensive insurance—not just liability. Comprehensive covers flood damage, fallen trees, and flying debris—common risks during a storm.

Living in Fort Myers Beach, comprehensive coverage isn't a luxury—it's a necessity.



Local Agents Know Local Risks

Insurance isn't one-size-fits-all, especially in a unique coastal community like ours. Online quotes may seem convenient, but they can leave dangerous gaps in coverage.

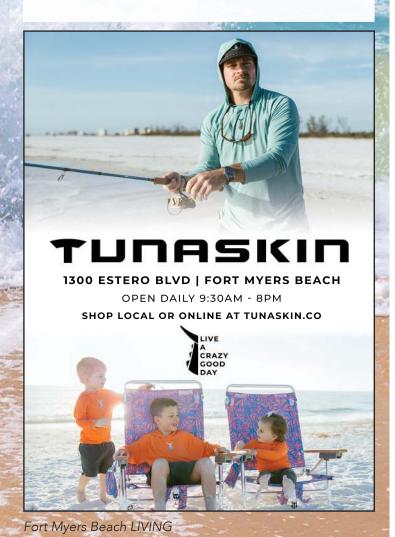

When we return to Michigan, there are a lot of cloudy days, but here the weather is more consistent with sunshine, and the outdoor lifestyle appeals to us." Chamber Chatter! Welcome to The Offseason!

Fort Myers Beach has officially transitioned from Tourism Season to Offseason! What's the difference?

In winter, visitors – known as Snowbirds and Seasonals – flock here from across the US and around the world, making FMB a national and international destination. In summer, however, our "Drive Market" takes over, with guests coming from across Southwest Florida and nearby major

cities like Miami, Orlando, and Tampa. Years ago, we also saw a strong influx of international visitors, especially from Germany, during the summer. While those numbers haven't fully returned post-COVID, there's a positive trend: major airlines are reinstating Florida routes, so we're watching a continued growth in that segment.

To better understand where our visitors are coming from, the FMB Chamber

is collecting zip code data at The Roxie, our Visitor Information Center in Times Square. Once we've gathered enough information, we'll compile the results – along with visitor feedback – and report them in an upcoming edition of "Chamber Chatter." One early insight: visitors are asking fewer questions about hurricane damage and more about classic vacation activities, like where to get the best seafood or how to book a dolphin tour. That shift is a great sign for both locals and our tourism industry.

Marketing FMB

You may be surprised to learn that neither the FMB Chamber nor the Town has a formal tourism marketing team. Instead, we rely on the Lee County Visitor & Convention Bureau (VCB) to promote our area nationally and internationally. Its current



campaign, "Just Feels Right," is live at www.visitfortmyers.com. Last Summer, the VCB ran the "Save Our Shores" campaign to support local businesses and we hope to see a similar push again this year.

In the meantime, once we analyze our zip code data, the FMB Chamber is planning to launch a targeted social media campaign to build interest for our 2025-2026 season.

Support Local During the Offseason

Our local community - especially residents of Lee, Charlotte, Collier and Hendry Counties – is critical to sustaining Fort Myers Beach business through the summer. Now that traffic is lighter and the crowds smaller, it's the perfect time to plan a beach day or a weekend "Stay-cation." Enjoy the shops, rent a wave runner or bike, and treat yourself to breakfast, lunch and dinner at one of our many fantastic restaurants.

For year-round residents, this is your time! Your favorite table is open, boat rentals are available, and the beach is peaceful and inviting. While the 2024-25 season marked significant improvement, we're not fully back to normal yet so please invite your family and friends to visit and support our island businesses.

FMB Art Association Opens New Gallery

The Fort Myers Beach Art Association (FMBAA) opened its new Gallery at 13451 McGregor Boulevard, Unit #1, in Cypress Square in Fort Myers, near the Prawnbroker Restaurant & Fish Market, on May 1. This new location is a temporary home for the FMBAA while they figure out how to rebuild their building at 3030 Shell Mound Boulevard that Hurricane Ian destroyed on September 28, 2022.

"The FMBAA operated out of the Fort Myers United Church of Christ since that devastating day," explains Star Sherwood, who began her new two-year term as FMBAA President on April 1. "They graciously let us use their Fellowship Hall for our board meetings, member events, classes and workshops. Other nearby venues, like the Alliance for the Arts, were equally gracious in allowing us to use their spaces for our art shows and exhibits, but that brought challenges, like paying a larger share of our artist's commissions than they were formerly paying. The obvious solution was to once again have our own gallery."

Star explains that "the FMBAA is not yet in a financial position to rebuild on our island home property, so we continued on page 14





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looked around FMB, as that is where we want to be, but we could not find anything that was large enough, that we could afford, or was high enough off the ground, as we still fear future flooding. The next best option was to find someplace as close to the island as possible, and we came across the beautiful Cypress Square location. It is lovely, with a magnificent courtyard and offers good foot traffic, so we signed a three-year lease."

The new gallery displayed the FMBAA's first Exhibit, "Spring Fling." "We then hosted a 'soft opening' on Thursday evening, May 1," Star offers. "The formal opening will occur when our new season starts in the Fall, on Saturday, November 1, so we hope the entire beach community joins us! The new FMBAA Gallery is open to the public on Thursdays through Saturdays with free admission from Noon to 6 p.m. After October 15, we will open six days a week."

The FMBAA will not wait until Fall however to inaugurate its new gallery. "We are filling our display walls with a series of month-long Summer exhibits," Star says. "'Splash' is from June 2 through 28, followed by 'Fireworks' from July 7 through 30, 'Summer Sizzle' from August 1 to September 19, then our 'Plein Air' show from September 25 through October 24." In addition to these non-juried exhibits, the FMBAA hosts its Summer show, "Ripples," at the Tribby Arts Center at Shell Point from May 17 to July 19.

Still Our Dream

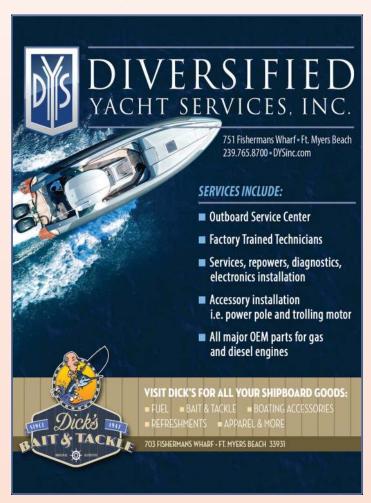
While the FMBAA is now off-island, its long-term goal is to come back to FMB. "We retain our Shell Mound Boulevard property and it is still our dream to return. Fundraising is extremely difficult and rebuilding is more expensive, as we must go higher to avoid future floods. Our Board of Directors decided to move forward with our rental space because we need a place to hang our hats, sell our artwork, and offer classes and workshops. In addition to the new gallery, the FMBAA hopes to reinvigorate its membership. "Pre-Ian, we had roughly 150 members,"

relates Star. "Some left FMB while others are rebuilding their lives, so today we have 111 members, but with our new home, we are hoping that our membership increases. The FMBAA is very much a working artists group, so stop by and watch us work and ask questions, as we would love to see you."

"Better yet, come see us at the gallery and you can immediately begin! FMBAA members receive discounts on our workshops and classes, along with the free use of our gallery where you can paint every day. You will learn so much from our members and have an exciting time doing it."

Star became an FMBAA member roughly 9 years ago, shortly after she retired and moved to FMB. "I was looking for volunteer opportunities and was riding my bicycle past the gallery. The door was open and I saw people inside, so I stopped to ask if they needed any help, like cleaning the gallery. They all laughed and suggested I try my hand at art instead and I immediately became a member! The greatest aspect of the FMBAA is its members, as we all care about each other, work together and treat each other like family. Even though our current home is off-island, we still maintain a large presence on FMB. You will see our artist-members all over the island, as the FMBAA is still a part of it all!"



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
