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


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Hello Friends & Neighbors!

"I grew up in Cincinnati but once I attended the University of Indiana, I never returned," laughs Joy Sullivan! "After graduating and eventually marrying Kevin, we lived in Indianapolis for ten years, then relocated to Chicago for the next thirty." "I was born in South Bend," relates Kevin. "Dad settled there after returning from his service in the Second World War and the Korean War and I became his fourth son. "Sadly, Bay Oaks remains shut due to the aftereffects of Hurricanes Helene and Milton, but we hope to reopen the gymnasium this Spring. We still host Senior Softball as well as the outside pickleball courts. As for the Community Foundation and Woman's Club, they are wonderful organizations that benefit our island community in innumerable ways. The Woman's Club recently reintroduced the annual St. Patrick's Day Parade and it was a total blast! The women in both clubs are fantastic; in addition to all the community initiatives, it is the deep friendships I have in both organizations that mean the most to me."

Kevin is on the Condo Grounds Committee and on the Board of the community's neighborhood association. "We maintain Bay Beach Lane and the water reclamation system for the adjacent 57 acres that was formerly the old FMB Golf Club. The natural beauty of this area is priceless!" "We love to volunteer," Joy summarizes, "because we are committed to the island."

The Sullivans enjoy golfing, pickleball, boating and kayaking, and they love to keep track of their nearby Bald Eagles nest and their annual eaglets! "I walk a lot as well," Kevin offers. "I used to do six miles a day but when I began working on the Grounds Committee, I discovered that I covered 20,000 steps a day so now I kill two birds with one stone while making our island look nicer! I soon discovered that I did not know much about our flora and fauna, so every day I took a photograph of one critter and vegetation, then would explore Wikipedia to learn what they were. Volunteering always meant a lot to me; when I was younger, I volunteered with Junior Achievement of Central Indiana and was the president of my Kiwanis Club, but then you travel for work and raise a family and you do not have time. Now that we are retired, we enjoy paying it back along with all the positive benefits we get from doing so."


Great People & Natural Beauty

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
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

As a resident of Fort Myers Beach, you may be familiar with the Everglades. It's one of the world's most unique ecosystems, spanning 16 Florida counties, including our own. It supplies critical drinking water for millions, while supporting world-class fishing, buffering coastal communities from storm surge, helping stabilize our pristine coastline, and bolstering our state's vital tourism and real estate sectors. The Everglades also provides habitat for more than 70 threatened and endangered species, and encompasses 14 National Wildlife Refuges and four National Parks, including Everglades National Park.

Unfortunately, though, the Everglades is suffering from massive environmental damage. Over the past century, manmade water diversions and flood control projects altered historic water flows in the Everglades thereby converting large areas to agricultural and residential uses. Consequently, too much polluted water is often pumped from Lake Okeechobee to the coasts of Florida – sparking outbreaks of toxic algae blooms damaging the Caloosahatchee and St. Lucie estuaries – while too little freshwater is flowing south to the Everglades and Florida Bay.

Everglades restoration is the answer to reversing the harm to the ecosystem. Since its founding in 1993, The Everglades Foundation has been the leading champion for restoration by providing bipartisan solutions backed by sound scientific research led by its own in-house team of world-class Ph.D. scientists. Through science, advocacy, and education, The

Everglades Foundation is devoted to restoring and protecting America's Everglades.

In 2000, Congress passed the Comprehensive Everglades Restoration Plan (CERP) – a plan whose 68 projects represents the largest ecosystem restoration project on the planet. CERP serves as an international model for ecosystem restoration.

The Foundation works tirelessly to secure the state and federal funding needed to implement restoration projects to fix South Florida's outdated water infrastructure. These projects will restore the flow of desperately needed water to the Everglades and Florida Bay, and reduce discharges of pollutants that cause perennial outbreaks of red tide to our coast.

Among the most noteworthy restoration projects is the Everglades Agricultural

Area (EAA) Reservoir, considered "the crown jewel" of Everglades restoration. Ground was broken in February 2023 on the reservoir, which, together with other projects completed and those underway, will send clean freshwater south to the Everglades and Florida Bay. No other project will play a bigger role in reducing harmful discharges from Lake Okeechobee.

The Foundation also works to educate future generations on the vital importance of Everglades restoration and protection through its Everglades Literacy Program. Established in 2014, the free program offers the world's only comprehensive PreK-12 curriculum complete with customized teacher training courses, symposia, and other resources.

Chamber Chatter! Tallahassee Road Trip!

From March 23rd to 25th, thirty-plus fellow Southwest Floridians from all industries and backgrounds, including myself, made the 8-hour journey to Tallahassee for "Southwest Florida Days!" This is a fantastic opportunity to meet with our state legislators to discuss pending legislation that will impact both our businesses and daily lives.

The Chamber of Southwest Florida hosted the trip that included the 2025 Leadership Lee class, along with the Southwest Florida Alliance of Chambers, representing seven of SWFL's Chambers including the FMB Chamber. Special thanks to David Miller, Executive Director of the Chamber of Southwest Florida, for organizing the impactful annual trip. Additional thanks to Alliance Chair Donna Germain, President of the Cape Coral Chamber of Commerce, for their generous sponsorship of the event. The FMB Chamber also helped to host the trip that celebrated the 25th anniversary of "Southwest Florida Days."

Our group was composed of business leaders from across Southwest Florida, non-profit partners, local government representatives, construction and home-building professionals, real estate agents and others. It was a great cross-section of our community. In addition to myself, FMB Chamber Board Members Ron Clayton of Waste Management and Kathy Stefanski of Lake Michigan Credit Union represented their companies and the FMB Chamber.

With such a diverse group, each sector has its own legislative priorities, but we all shared common goals like securing continued funding for Everglades Restoration. We urged legislators to keep supporting vital water quality improvements, especially those related to water flowing from Lake Okeechobee down the Caloosahatchee River and into FMB. As we all learned in 2018, during the twin crises of Red Tide and Blue Green Algae, water quality is EVERYTHING for FMB!

Our group met with, among others, State Senator Jonathan Martin, State Senator Kathleen Passidomo, Representative Yvette Benarroch, and Representative Adam Botana. Our legislative leaders all expressed appreciation for our trip to Tallahassee during session, noting that many of us are small business owners who took time away from our businesses during peak season to speak with them. They emphasized the importance of trips like this, as Florida's Legislature will propose roughly 2,000 bills in this session, yet only about 200 will become law.

Hot Topic for 2025

One of the major topics of discussion was Single Member Districts for Lee County Commissioners. If this legislation moves forward, it will certainly be a hot topic for 2025. This is a complex issue for a small community like FMB,

given our relatively small voting bloc. Currently, we can petition all five Lee County Commissioners when relevant issues arise, but a Single Member District Commissioner system would mean appealing to just one. Which format would give FMB a louder voice? Voters should pay close attention to this issue as it progresses, and the Chamber will work to keep FMB constituents informed without taking an official stance.

In addition to meeting our legislators, we heard presentations from Samantha Padgett, Vice President of Governmental Relations and Chief Counsel of the Florida Restaurant & Lodging Association, as well as from Andrew Wiggins, the Senior Director of Political Affairs & Coalitions Advocacy for the Florida Chamber of Commerce. We appreciate their insights on important topics and ongoing legislation.

Amid all our advocacy work, we squeezed in some fun! We toured the Judicial Chambers, the Old Capitol Building, the Florida Senate Chamber and the recent Capitol Building renovations. 

The all-volunteer non-profit Turtle Time, Inc., begun by Eve Haverfield in 1989, begins its 36th consecutive season of monitoring marine turtles on Fort Myers Beach as well as Big Hickory Island and Bonita and Bunche Beaches. Florida's nesting sea turtle season is May 1 through October 31, though Turtle Time in recent years starts their monitoring on April 15 because turtles can nest as soon as the Gulf waters reach 80 degrees. Fort Myers Beach is the almost-exclusive domain of Loggerheads (Caretta caretta), though Turtle Time found its first documented Green (Chelonia mydas) nests on FMB in 2019

"Turtle nesting is cyclical," explains Eve. "Loggerheads tend to nest every other year so we look to 2023 for clues. We had just 71 nests that year but these things are not written in cement so you never know what you will get until the end of each season. In addition to that low 2023 number, turtle nesting may be a challenge this year because the Town of FMB is doing a beach restoration that is not yet complete. Hopefully the turtles will avoid the renourishment pipe area where it is redistributing the sand for spots where they can crawl well up onto the beach to lay their nests. We will relocate any nests in the active construction area; however, we are required to leave all nests deposited on the completed beach even if the nest is too close to the Gulf. Because of the renourishment pipe, we do expect a considerable number of false crawls this year, but we will have to wait and see."

The primary bane to nesting turtles and their hatchlings is visible artificial light from beach properties. Turtles

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for millennia had quiet dark beaches to themselves, but now they must compete with businesses and coastal residents. These lights can prevent females from coming ashore or they choose an inferior nesting location from which few hatchlings survive. Lights disorient hatchlings, causing them to move toward that source and away from the Gulf, resulting in their death from dehydration, exhaustion, or automobiles.

A "Win-Win" All the Way Around

Eve constantly stresses that people who live on or within the visible view of the beach need to use turtle-friendly Amber LED lighting. "An exciting development is that the Town will retrofit all the Estero Boulevard streetlights with Amber LED lighting beginning this year," she relates. "Amber LED lighting is safe and easy on the eyes and bright enough for people yet has a wavelength that does not bother or attract the nesting turtles so it is truly a 'Win-Win' all the way around."

Turtle Time encourages FMB residents to proactively protect sea turtles and hatchlings. Please switch to Amber LED lights that are turtle-friendly, close drapes and blinds after dark, never shine a flashlight or use flash photography on sea turtles, move boats or beach furniture behind beach vegetation nightly, keep dogs on a leash, and fill in any holes dug into the sand as hatchlings and adult turtles can fall in and die. Only 1 to 4 out of every 1,000 hatchlings survive to adulthood. It takes 30 to 50 years for them to reach maturity, so living nesting sea turtles survive long odds and need the help of humans.

Loggerheads are the primary sea turtles to nest on FMB. "In 2019 a Green sea turtle nested here," raves Eve! We sure would like to bask in the joy of 2019 again, when we had a total of 11 Greens on the beaches that we monitor. Sanibel, meanwhile, has documented multiple Green nests and even

Leatherbacks (Dermochelys coriacea) in recent years! Perhaps our Greens will return to FMB or Bonita Beach this year!"

You Are The Best!

Like everyone on FMB, Eve hopes for a calm Southwest Florida 2025 hurricane season. "Storms are hard on turtle nests and 2024 with Hurricanes Debby, Helene and Milton was a perfect example," offers Eve. "Last year, we had 257 total nests but just 124 hatched and some of those nests had just 2 or 3 hatchlings that survived. While that is tragic, sad and depressing, the thing that keeps us positive is that nesting sea turtles have existed for millions of years, through all kinds of storms and challenging environments, so they are hearty! Each nesting sea turtle will lay multiple nests each season, so the odds that one of her nests will survive are reasonable so they continue to replenish their genetic material. While seasons like 2024 occur, we can tolerate those because that is nature; the turtles we lose from human incursions like improper lights or tampering with turtle nests are the ones that are truly tragic and upsetting because of those losses are preventable."

"Of these, contact us at Turtle Time first," stresses Eve. "We can respond the quickest, because when are you dealing with a hatchling or a distressed turtle, every minute matters."

Eve expresses her sincere appreciation "to all the people who care enough about nesting sea turtles, nature and our fragile coastal environment to share the beach with nesting sea turtles and shorebirds in a responsible and friendly way − You Are The Best!" ■



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
